Mixtures & Solutions Lesson for Kids: Definitions & Examples

All solutions are mixtures of two or more substances, but unless the mixture has a homogeneous distribution of solutes in the solvent, then the mixture is not a solution. Therefore, all mixtures are not solutions.

Examples of solutions include air (gas), dissolved oxygen in water (liquid), and mercury in gold amalgam (solid), opal (solid), and gelatin (solid). Colloid: A colloidal solution appears homogeneous to the naked eye, but particles are apparent under microscope magnification. Particle sizes range from 1 nanometer to 1 micrometer.

Solutions and Mixtures Before we dive into solutions, let's separate solutions from other types of mixtures. Solutions are groups of molecules that are mixed and evenly distributed in a system. Scientists say that solutions are homogenous systems. Everything in a solution is evenly spread out and thoroughly mixed.

Mixtures in two or more phases are heterogeneous mixtures. Examples include ice cubes in a drink, sand and water, and salt and oil. The liquid that is immiscible form heterogeneous mixtures. A good example is a mixture of oil and water. Chemical solutions are usually homogeneous mixtures.

Can all mixtures be solutions - Answers

Whenever you separate a mixture or a solution, there will always be the same amount of each part as there was before they were mixed. This is called conservation of matter. Imagine that you mix 2 grams of sugar into 1 liter of water. If you evaporate the water, there will be 2 grams of sugar left.

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In this example the water is the solvent and the salt is the solute. What is the difference between a solution and a mixture? In chemistry a solution is actually a type of mixture. A solution is a mixture that is the same or uniform throughout. Think of the example of salt water. This is also called a "homogenous mixture."

Mixtures do not have a fixed, definite formula, but compounds do. Individual substances keep their properties in a mixture, while their properties change if they react to become a compound. 12 Examples of Common Mixtures:

Aerated drinks, Salt-water or Sugar water mixtures, fruit juices are some of the examples for solutions. Some solutions are heterogeneous in nature and they are termed as suspension. Such suspended particles can be seen quite clearly in the solution.

Types of Solutions - Different Types, Homogeneous ...

There are three phases of matter - solid, liquid, and gas - and all heterogeneous mixtures involve some combination of one or two of these phases. For example, two liquids that are mixed together is not the same as a solid and liquid being mixed or even a gas and a solid being mixed.

Carbonated water, vodka and saline are all examples of homogeneous solutions. Homogeneous solutions should not be confused with heterogeneous suspensions, in which the components are made up of larger and less-uniform particles. In order for a homogeneous mixture to be a solution, two different substances must be mixed together.

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
