Takeaways: Registered nurses providing moderate procedural sedation and analgesia must demonstrate

Nursing considerations for procedural sedation and ...

These guidelines specifically apply to the level of sedation

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corresponding to moderate sedation/analgesia (previously called conscious sedation), which is defined as a drug-induced depression of consciousness during which patients respond purposefully † to verbal commands, either alone or accompanied by light tactile stimulation. No interventions are required to maintain a

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patent airway when
spontaneous
ventilation is adequate.

Conscious Sedation/Moderate Sedation

Moderate sedation/analgesia may be referred to as moderate sedation,

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conscious sedation, nurse-administered procedural sedation, nurse-administered propofol sedation, or procedural sedation and analgesia. The term moderate sedation/analgesia is used throughout this document in the recommendations and activities. Other terms may be seen in the rationales if the cited literature refers to moderate

Sedation Administration - SGNA

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Specifically trained Registered Nurses may assist in the administration of conscious sedation. The AANA (American Association of Nurse Anesthetists) further states “that the provider who monitors the patient receiving conscious sedation should have no other responsibilities during the procedure and should remain with the patient at all times

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during the procedure.”

1. GUIDELINES: PROCEDURAL SEDATION MANAGEMENT

Rule 150-13-.01
Conscious Sedation
Permits. (1) When the
intent is minimal

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sedation (anxiolysis), which is defined as a minimally depressed level of consciousness that retains the patient's ability to independently and continuously maintain an airway with unaffected ventilatory and cardiovascular function and respond normally to tactile and verbal stimulation, a permit for conscious sedation is not required.

“...qualified registered nurses routinely administer sedatives and paralytics for intubation under direct supervision of an ordering provider, they are similarly qualified and capable of administering medications for procedural sedation while under the direct supervision of the ordering provider.”⁶

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Sedation **NURSES IN PROCEDURAL SEDATION, ANALGESIA ...**

Once sedation is achieved, additional doses should be 25% of the dose required to produce the sedative endpoint; for maintenance, use 0.25 milligram to 1 milligram. Total dose: Usually less than or equal to 5 milligrams. Reduce dose by 30% if patient was

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premedicated with a narcotic or other CNS depressant.

MODERATE SEDATION MODULE

Administers intravenous medications one at a time, in incremental doses, and titrated to desired effect (ie, moderate sedation that enables the patient to maintain his or her protective reflexes, airway patency, and
