Young children usually go through a silent period. When you begin speaking a foreign language to a young child, she'll most likely understand long before she answers in that language.

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Don't worry if the children you teach only answer in their native language at first. Keep using the foreign language and eventually they'll respond.

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Use children's "home name" to help them feel comfortable and free to talk. Share assorted picture books that are written in the child's home language. Spend time with the child, individually or within a small group, modeling conversation skills and techniques and teaching vocabulary.
