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As usual in Shakespeare, the classification of characters is not a

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simple matter. In Twelfth Night Malvolio is something of a tragic character but there is no doubt that he is very funny. It is not that we laugh with him, which is the case with many of Shakespeare's comic characters, but that we laugh at him. At the centre of the play there is a very cruel joke played on the pompous, puritanical, quite unpleasant Malvolio, the steward of Olivia's household, where he is disliked by everyone.

Shakespeare was also remarkable for insisting on the comic in the midst of tragedy. All his tragedies include clowning. The most notable example is the Fool in King Lear, who makes jokes out of the King's predicament and is permitted, under the guise of foolery, to admonish him.

As his 'commodity' speech suggests, the extent to which the Bastard Faulconbridge is meant to be a comic character is a vexed question, much as it is for the whole play. (As we've discussed elsewhere, one school of thought sees King John as a comic satire rather than a serious historical play.)

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
