Thus communicative competence means the mastery of an ideal speech situation". D. Hymes (1972) was generally in consensus with the view of R. Campbell and R. Wales by arguing that, in addition to linguistic competence, the native speaker has another rule system without which the rules of grammar would be useless.

For him, competence refers to the innate knowledge of a language an ideal speaker has in a homogeneous speech community.
